

Willem Buiter was born in Den Haag, the Netherlands and educated at the European School, Brussels, the University of Amsterdam, Cambridge University (where he obtained a BA in Economics) and Yale University, where James Tobin supervised his Ph.D. in economics. He has held academic appointments at Princeton University, the University of Bristol, the London School of Economics and Political Science, Yale University and the University of Cambridge.

In June 1997, he was appointed by the Chancellor of the Exchequer of the UK to a three-year term as a member of the Monetary Policy Committee of the Bank of England. From May 2000 till August 2005, he was Chief Economist and Special Adviser to the President at the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development. On September 1, 2005 he was appointed to the Chair in European Political Economy in the European Institute at the London School of Economics and Political Science.

He has been a consultant and advisor to the International Monetary Fund, The World Bank, The Inter-American Development Bank, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the European Communities and a large number of national governments and government agencies in developing countries, emerging markets and advanced industrial countries.

Since March 2005 he chairs the Council of Economic Advisors of the Dutch Parliament.

Since September 2005 he is an Advisor to Goldman Sachs International.

He has published widely on subjects such as open economy macroeconomics, monetary and exchange rate theory, financial markets, fiscal policy, social security and pension reform, economic development and transition economies.

He was elected a Fellow of the British Academy in 1998. In 2000 he was awarded the CBE for 'services to economics'.
