

<u>Alessandro Gullo</u> is Assistant General Counsel at the Legal Department of the International Monetary Fund. He is leading the Financial and Fiscal Law Division, in charge of advising on monetary, financial and fiscal law reforms in IMF's member countries, in the context of IMF's financial assistance programs, surveillance, and technical assistance projects. Mr. Gullo has advised a wide range of countries across the globe on the design and implementation of their fiscal and financial legal frameworks, also in the context of the IMF's financial assistance. In his current capacity, he is contributing to the IMF's digitalization agenda through analytical papers on the various

forms of private and public digital money, and country advice on legal reforms in this area. He serves in various committees of international organizations contributing to international standards, particularly in the financial sector area. Mr. Gullo published on banking and fiscal law matters, such as on the legal reforms adopted by countries in response to the pandemic crisis, the legal design of resolution regimes, central clearing counterparties and fiscal governance. Before joining the IMF in 2008, Mr. Gullo worked for international law firms, in Europe and in the United States, advising on banking and financial law and public sector financing. He holds a LL.M. (Master of Laws) with distinction from Georgetown University, and he is admitted to the New York and the Italian Bar.
